IMPORTANT UPDATES

Why is the Court Reserve countdown timer before event registration often incorrect?

We submitted this question to the fine folks at Court Reserve. The short answer is, they are working on it. From Court Reserve: "This countdown is not really working real time, and is intended to show you the time left at the time when you open the page. After reviewing this more with our team we see how this is confusing and we are going to improve it, maybe by showing the exact date and time when registration opens, instead of showing x hours and minutes. We added this on the list to discuss more with the team to include it in an upcoming development."

Keeping all of the balls in the air!

Did you know the Club budgets more than \$7,000 a year for pickleballs? We're looking for ways to get the most out of them. We have found 43% of pickleballs in the yellow buckets are still playable. We believe we have an opportunity to save as much as 25% on the Club's ball expenses with these two easy steps:

- Check the size of the crack in the ball. If the crack is significant or extends hole to hole, it's a goner. We've done some research and found that a small crack(s) doesn't significantly impact performance. Try it out for another round or two. You can always blame the cracked ball for that whiff.
- If the ball is egged out (out of round), it's a goner. If it has major soft spots, it's a goner. We check each ball in the bucket and for some of the newer ones that have cracks or are egged out, we can receive a credit.

As a courtesy to the nightly Club volunteers who straighten the chairs and pick up balls on courts, when finished playing your matches, please pick up and return your ball to the ball sleeve.



FINAL 4 EVENT

June 24th Pilot Tournament



The Club held a pilot for a new format for the Final 4 on the evening of June 24. We had 8 teams of 3.5 men and 8 teams of 3.5 women entered in the event. The format chosen was to have two groups of 4 teams each for the men and women. Each group played a round robin against the other three teams, two games to 11, win by 1. At the end of group play, each group had a first through fourth place finisher. In the finals for the event, group A played against group B with 1st place playing against 1st place, 2nd against 2nd, etc. The finals were intended to be two games out of three to 11, win by 2. Everyone plays 8-9 games total.

THE PARTICIPANTS

The weather was very hot as we approached the date of the event so the start time was moved to 7 pm.

Two special accommodations were made as a result of the heat, first there were 2 men and 2 women subs that, if requested, could step in and play.

Second, the teams were given a choice in the final round to play one game to 15, two games to 11 win by 1 or the original 2 out of 3 games to 11, win by 2.

These accommodations will not be a standard in the regular Final 4 Event.

Overall, the pilot was a success and the feedback from the players was very positive. We want to thank everyone who participated, refereed and the spectators who cheered everyone on, as well as the committee and volunteers who helped plan and execute the event.

We did learn some important lessons and reinforced some things we thought we knew:

- the lights on courts 1-8 go out promptly at 10 pm, need to ensure event will end before that time
- it is very hot in the evenings during summer months, if an event like this is to be held, early morning is a cooler option, although players did enjoy playing under the lights
- having referees for an event like this is really nice for the players
- having refreshments for the spectators and players is a nice touch
- the format guaranteed every player would get 8-9 games in, this was seen as a positive from the players, although not getting to see their friends play was a small drawback
- overall, the players enjoyed the format for the event



A huge thank you to Alex Potapoff and Renee DeLassus for organizing and making this event a success, to the players for supporting the pilot and playing in extreme heat, and to the spectators who came out to watch and offer encouragement!

SAFETY

Avoid a Pickleball Eye Injury

A broken bone from a fall on the pickleball courts will hopefully heal over time, but an eye injury may lead to permanent vision loss. Wearing protective eyewear is your best way to prevent a serious eye injury.



A pickleball can reach a speed of 40 mph. A slammed ball from one paddle to another when opposing players are at the non-volley line can be less than half a second. Even with a great reaction time, it is difficult to see the ball hit your opponent's paddle and for you to begin to move to protect your face to avoid being hit. You won't be able to protect your eyes with your paddle or to even turn your head in time. Serious damage can also occur from being hit in the eye with a paddle.

Common eye injuries that occur while playing pickleball are:

- Orbital fracture
- Ruptured globe
- Vitreous hemorrhage
- Detached retina

To protect yourself, you should consistently use protective eyewear such as sunglasses, sports glasses or goggles. It is recommended that they be shatterproof and made out of a polycarbonate material. The goal is to wear protective glasses or goggles that can withstand a direct shot or a ball that ricochets off a paddle and strikes you in the

eye. I experienced a direct shot while at the non-volley line, by an opponent who was at the non-volley line. The ball hit my sunglasses and the impact knocked me over. Fortunately for me my sunglasses absorbed the direct hit.

Some protective glasses have different lenses that can be switched out for use indoors or outdoors in full sun or on an overcast day. You can find a wide selection on the internet and some can be worn over your own glasses. If you are playing a lot of pickleball, remember that the radiation from UV light from the sun can cause damage to your eyes, so consider the benefit of UV protection.

Should you experience an eye injury and have a loss or change in vision, pain, bruising or bleeding, you need to follow up with a physician or Ophthalmologist immediately for evaluation and possible treatment to preserve your eyesight. In the event of an injury, we request that an accident report form be completed. You will find the forms in the ice machine room.

Remember, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure."

Pat Chernow also shared injury statistics at the last monthly board meeting. She advised we have had 11 reports filed to date for 2021. 8 were females and 3 were males. The injuries consisted of 11 falls; 4 fractures; 4 pulled muscles; and 1 rapid heart rate. Five of the incidents were reported at the In-House Tournament.

Safety should remain the first goal of every game!


